ANNUAL MEETING, NOVEMBER 27, 2000

THE MAIN BUSINESS TRANSACTED WAS THE ELECTION OF THE 2001 BOARD. OF THOSE PRESENT THE PRESIDENT, VICE PRESIDENT AND TREASURER WERE REELECTED AS WERE NANCY FREDENBURG, JIM VICHICH AND CAROL MCMACKEN TO DIRECTOR POSITIONS.

SEVERAL MORE DIRECTORS ARE NEEDED AND THE OFFICE OF SECRETARY NEEDS TO BE FILLED. A MEMBER WHO CAN ATTEND BOARD MEETINGS REGULARLY TO RECORD BOARD ACTIVITIES IS NEEDED TO SERVE AS SECRETARY.

ALSO NEEDED ARE CHAIRPERSONS FOR THE HISTORIC RESOURCE SURVEY, FUND RAISING, PREPARATION OF GRANT AND HISTORIC SITE APPLICATIONS, STOCKING OF SALES ITEMS, PHOTOGRAPHING OF EARLY STRUCTURES BEFORE THEY'RE ALL GONE.

ANNUAL REPORT OF SOCIETY ACTIVITY

IF ONE HAD UNLIMITED SPACE THIS REPORT WOULD NOT BE DIFFICULT TO PREPARE. MUCH HAS BEEN ACCOMPLISHED IN 2000.

ALL YEAR LONG MANY ROTARY CLUB MEMBERS HAVE WILLINGLY CONTRIBUTED MUCH TIME, LABOR AND MATERIALS TO THE RESTORATION OF THE 1885 LYONS ONE ROOM SCHOOL IN BRIGHTON TOWNSHIP. THIS ALL CULMINATED IN THE 'BLITZ BUILD' THE END OF OCTOBER. IT WAS ASTONISHING TO SEE WALLS, FLOORS, PLUMBING, PAINTING, DOOR INSTALLATION, LANDSCAPING, RAMP BUILDING, FENCE AND EXTERIOR PAINTING HAPPEN AS DOZENS OF PEOPLE EXERTED EVERY EFFORT. DURING THE YEAR WATER, HEATING, PLUMBING, ELECTRICITY, CONCRETE WALKS (INFRASTRUCTURE) WAS INSTALLED.

CHRIS WARD, BRIGHTON TOWNSHIP CLERK, HAS WORKED WITH DEDICATION ON HIS GOAL AS CHAIRMAN OF THE LYONS SCHOOL RESTORATION. IT TAKES PEOPLE LIKE HIM TO STIMULATE OTHERS IN THAT DIRECTION.

THE SCHOOL RESTORATION WAS AN IMPRESSIVE RESULT ONE CAN SEE. OTHERS DEDICATED THEMSELVES TO LESS VISIBLE, BUT MOST NECESSARY PROJECTS.

SEVERAL LONG TIME RESIDENTS HAVE BEEN INTER-VIEWED FOR THE ORAL HISTORY PROGRAM. LORRY WAGNER AND SHERYL VIGMOSTAD ARE CONTINUING THEIR EFFORTS.

THE MONTHLY NEWSLETTER IS MAILED BY SEVERAL WILLING MEMBERS. JOHN AND JANICE FIELD AND ANNE STRATIGOS HAND DELIVER ABOUT 250. CER-TIFICATES FOR BUSINESS/PROFESSIONAL MEMBERS ARE PREPARED. WE'VE BEEN ABLE TO SPEAK TO SEVERAL LOCAL SCHOOL GROUPS AND OTHERS ON LOCAL HISTORY. THE BOARD REGULARLY ASSESSES THE MANNER IN WHICH IT CONDUCTS BUSINESS. GRANT APPLICATIONS ARE PREPARED, POLICIES ARE REVIEWED, NEW PROJECTS ARE CONSIDERED AND VARIOUS FUND RAISING POSSIBILITIES ARE ANALYZED. THE SOCIETY IS INVOLVED WITH OTHER COMMUNITY ORGANIZATIONS AND GOVERNING BODIES IN DEVELOPING AN AWARENESS OF THE VALUE TO OUR SENSE OF PLACE OF HISTORIC PRESERVATION AND RESTORATION.

AREA FARMS C. 1900

RESEARCH OF LOCAL FARMS AND FARMERS, THEIR BACKGROUND AND LOCATION AS LISTED IN THE BRIGHTON ARGUS, CONTINUES. MYRON WEST'S FAIR VIEW IS THIS ISSUE'S SUBJECT.

In the 1870 census of Livingston County we find the first evidence of Myron West Living in Brighton Township. He is working for Hiram Nichols who has 120 acres in Section 35, SE4. (The present site of Brighton Hospital. The house, which formed the nucleus of the Hospital was moved to its present location from a site much closer to the Grand River Trail.)

By 1895 West owns 80 acres about one mile north, FAIR VIEW, Section 26, N\frac{1}{2} SE\frac{1}{4}. Robert Edgar, from Ireland, and wife, Nancy Whalen, of LivingstonCounty, N.Y., had purchased this 80 acres from the U.S. government by 1835. One notes a house on the site on the 1859 atlas. (It's likely the lumber was sawed at the nearby Woodruff Mill on Pleasant Valley Road.) In 1879 this was transferred by Robert, who died the next year, to his 24 year old son Emery. His widowed sister, Mathilda Hudson, and her three children are Living there, as is his 71 year old mother Nancy. At this time Emery is farming. It would appear brother Walter (wife Sarah and one year old Margery) are probably living in the Smaller of the two houses, just south of the larger. All are dependent on the farm.

Myron West, born in Farmington February 12, 1851, was the second of five brothers. By the time he is recorded as the owner of this 80 acre farm, he had married Katie V. Ferguson, a neighbor's daughter, January 5, 1881. Me did general farming, raising grain and livestock. When the milk factory was established in Brighton, he, as many others, switched to dairy farming.

THEIR ONLY CHILD, CARRIE VIOLA, MARRIED RUFUS DARLINGTON CHRISTMAS EVE, 1913, AND LIVED IN THE SMALLER HOUSE UNTIL AFTER HER MOTHER'S DEATH IN 1935. CARRIE WAS STILL ON THAT FARM WELL INTO THE 3RD QUARTER OF THE 20TH CENTURY. THE PRESENT BARN IS NOT THE ORIGINAL. THAT BURNED C. 1930 AS A RESULT OF CARRIE'S SON, VERN, PLAYING WITH MATCHES.

Myron, who died in 1923, Katie, Carrie and Rufus are buried in the Kensington Cemetery as are Robert and Nancy Edgar. The small house is presently in a state of disrepair. The Larger appears to have been undergoing repairs for some time.
