Preservation of the Past

Preservation of classic buildings and their history is an important goal of the Brighton Area Historical Society. All communities that value their past will encourage owners of businesses and homes from years ago to keep up the maintenance on their buildings. Of course this same behavior of placing value on older structures must be modeled through preservation efforts and actions by local government.

The Brighton Area Historical Society continues to reinvest through capital improvements in its 1885 Lyon One-room Schoolhouse. This community asset is over 130 years old. The paint on its exterior was in very weathered condition and needed major work. Through the generosity of community members and supportive friends, funds have been raised and dedicated for specific needed improvements. Most recently the old school's peeling skin of paint was scraped, primed and repainted. The newly painted building looks wonderful! Included in the painting was the four rail wooden fence that surrounds the school and the storage shed.

Thank you to all members who support this preservation effort with their annual membership dues and to those whose donations are so needed and valued.

A special thank you to Brighton Township and its trustees for passing the ownership of this important community and historical building to the historical society when their Township Hall was completed in 1984. 11455 Buno Road, west of Pleasant Valley Road. The 1885 Lyon School is a fully restored, barrier-free one-room schoolhouse and serves as our organization headquarters.

CoBACH Center

and the conclusion that a new structure was obviously needed for the library, a 20-member citizens' committee was formed to 2007. Nancy B. Construction of the 23,700 square foot building, the replacement of the original 13 lights lining the circular drive located at 100 Library Drive began May 2, 1995, at a cost of with new LED lights. Not to be overlooked is the repair of the \$43M. It was dedicated May 18, 1996 and was now open 56 driveway and parking lot. hours a week.

Besides the 24,000 books moved from the site in the Municipal Building, the new library could now accommodate 10,000 new books and house infrastructure to support computer networking and automation services; an expanded audio-visual collection and community meeting rooms. The Brighton Room is devoted exclusively to local history and genealogy, including maps, family histories, local history publications, microfilm of local history and other ephemera. This room also served as headquarters and archival filing of the Brighton Area Historical Society until its move to a former one-room rural school (Lyon School); deeded to the Society, August 2001, by the Brighton Township Board after the Township built new offices.
