OLD VILLAGE CEMETERY: RESPECT CONTINUES TO GROW

The Headstone Restoration/Preservation Team of the Brighton Area Historical Society has completed their 7th year in bringing broken and desecrated headstones back to their original form of honor and memory. The citizens of Brighton and the family members of our founders can smile with pride knowing this restoration program has surpassed the 75% completion stage. Family memorial markers across Old Village Cemetery continue to rise again from the shattered strewn pieces on the ground as the volunteer army has restored another (12) this summer. A grand total of (160) marble and granite memorials can now cast a shadow of the rising and setting sun over their grave sites.

Volunteer time for repairing headstones for the seven years is near 2800 hours. If a very minimal labor repair rate of \$40/hour is used for these skilled workers, then a low end savings would be \$112,000.

The volunteers encourage the Brighton City Council and community to pay their respects at Brighton's oldest cemetery. The first burial was 1838 for Truman Worden. His headstone can be found in the north east section not far from the Diary Queen.

Don't forget Veterans' Day is November 11. There are (45) Civil War and (2) WWII veterans buried in the Old Village Cemetery. Their grave sites are easily found by locating the US flag mounted on top of a blue 12" tall staff proudly displaying the attached military medallion.

Like all cities across the United States, Brighton sent their "boys" off to fight. The Brighton Argus published "Letters Home" every week letter home to Frances Conley, have new overcoats. was published August 7, 1918.

"My own dear mother"

How any times I have thought of

you today, and I suppose you are wondering what your boy is doing. Well I am not doing much today for a wonder. Going to a ballgame this afternoon if I can rake up ambition enough. Mother, I can't say that I was ever very ambitious but I guess I have lost what I had. I feel old now-a-days. Guess I have carried too many packs on my back. Getting so I hate the sight of that pack. If it were not for you dear Mother, I guess I would go mad, but you are all the world to me. I got your letter and it was a good one. In fact I hear from you folks 2 or 3 times a week. You see I have it on the rest of you for I can write as much as I like and it don't cost me a cent. It is often very difficult, however, to get paper.

I am feeling bum lately. A month in the front lines was too much Day", to honor all that lost their for me I guess. Seems good not to have shrapnel for breakfast, but I can hear the shells alright from here. It is Fourth of July all the time here. Mother—never fear for your boy Jesse—he is getting 3 squares a day and carries out his orders. You see this war perhaps different than it is. Our company has been very lucky. Hope it will continue, but our time may come yet.

> The 1st day of August, I will have had 6 months service in France. Every 6 months we get a gold stripe on our sleeve. Don't look for me for a long time Mother, although I would love to see you more than I can tell. My letter is crowding paper, so will say goodbye.

Jesse was killed August 2, one day after receiving his 6 month service gold bar and 5 days before his letter was published in the Argus. Jesse was the first local man to die in service in WWI, he was just 22 years of age. American Legion Post #235 was renamed in honor of Jesse B. Cooley.
