<u>Interesting Facts About Brighton Schools — 1908—1945</u>

1908: Class Motto: "Make Good." This graduating class was 6 members, entirely female.

1911: Local school boards were informed that Michigan School Law had been sufficiently amended to allow for increased power of the local school boards. The electors of local districts, rather than direct participation, would delegate former decision Brighton for approximately the next 30 years. making to the local school board.

1914: For the first time in the history of the Brighton schools, the district held eighth grade-promotional activities. Another first for education was indicated in the State of Michigan Instruction Manual. The suggested instruction for high schools was four divisions of the high school curriculum. The student would select either College Preparatory, Agriculture, Domestic Arts or Commercial.

1928: A student council had been established to give the students a voice in management and also for the purpose of raising standards of morals, inspiring loyalty to the school, and fostering cooperation between the students and faculty.

English, business arithmetic and typing. Men teaching in Brighton received a salary of \$1,825 per year and women were paid \$1,396 per year.

1935: Physical-training course was offered in the fall. This was the first time in the history of the school that this occurred. By spring, it was noted that the girls were having gym every day and that they had a track team.

1938: The school band had grown to 72 members. The musicians performed for the last time in their white capes and white trousers. Later in the month, a concert was held with the band members attired in brand-new orange and black uniforms.

1939: Public Act-54 required that all persons holding a Michigan teaching license were required to file an oath of allegiance that had to be properly notarized in the office of the Superintendent of Public Instruction. Teacher organizations in various states opposed the mandated signing of an oath. The swearing of loyalty to the United States continued to be required in

1941: The last class to experience a senior year that would be free of the atmosphere of war.

1944: The nation was three years into the war. The students at Brighton High School demonstrated the patriotic behavior which was obvious throughout the town. Students participated in paper drives, scrap drives, collection of grease and the purchase of savings stamps to support the war effort.

1945: The class graduated one month after V-E Day and two months before V-J Day. The war had lasted almost as long as these students had been in high school.

1930-1931: Enrollment was 340 pupils.
